Colorado Winners

Zing Credit Union

Denver

I would support the organization called A Precious Child. About 250,000 children live below the Colorado self-sufficiency standard in A Precious Child's service area. Children living in poverty are more likely to be in poor health, less likely to graduate high school on time and are more likely to live in poverty as adults. A Precious Child assists children and families facing difficult life challenges such as abuse and neglect, crisis situations and poverty. We work with more than 500 Agency Partners throughout eight counties to identify children and families in the most need of their services.

Estes Park

I would like to provide support to the Fine Arts Guild, which provides many services in the community including a community youth theatre where kids grades 3-12 create and perform in a Broadway musical. The youth empowerment is incredible, and additional funding helps the organization spend more time on youth and theater than fundraising.

I would like to donate to the Power of One Foundation. This funding would go toward the player fees for soccer players that are a part of low income or single parent households in Colorado Springs. Along with these player fees, players are provided a mentor through the organization. All children who attend from 0-17 receive a gift, and adults receive gifts until they run out along with two grand prize boxes for two lucky children. Once all the children and some adults receive a gift, we all head over to the McLouth City Park where all the businesses and organizations have placed a tree with lights on them. All the lights come on at once, and the high school band plays Christmas songs. As you can imagine this is the perfect way to start the holiday season for an average of 125 to 150 people of the community.

The Farmers' State Bank of Jetmore, a branch of Bank of Hays Jetmore

For communities of our size to survive, people have to work together for the good of all residents. The Jetmore City Library has taken on a project in hopes of opening formative discussions that could be of benefit to our city and entire county. The newly formed "Community Conversation" is a series of events that hopefully will help discover our community's needs and preferences. The Jetmore City Library staff is facilitating these conversations that are scheduled for one hour as question/answer and general information discussions. Were our library and these conversations to be awarded \$500, they could use the funds to assist in per diem/travel charges for solicited out-of-town speakers, aid with visuals and other costs of presentations, even down to providing refreshments to the attendees and staff.

I would like to dedicate this wreath on the evening of the Community party to honor all the current volunteers to this town, those dedicated volunteers of year's past and those future volunteers!
